Nine things to know about Title IX:

Number one: Title IX is a landmark federal civil rights law that prohibits sex discrimination in education. Title IX is not just about sports, it also addresses sexual harassment, gender based discrimination, and sexual violence.

Two: Title IX does not apply to female students only. Males and gender non-conforming students are protected, too.

Three: schools must be proactive in ensuring that your campus is free of sex discrimination. They just can't wait for something to go wrong.

Four: schools must have an established procedure for handling complaints of sex discrimination, harassment, and violence.

Five: schools must take immediate action to ensure that a survivor can continue his or her education safely.

Six: schools may not retaliate or let someone else retaliate against a victim filing a complaint.

Seven: schools can issue a no-contact directive to prevent the accused student from interacting with you. Kind of like a restraining order from your school.

Eight: in cases of sexual violence, schools are prohibited from encouraging or allowing informal mediation of the complaint, rather than a formal hearing.

Nine: schools can not discourage you from your continuing education, since you have a right to education under title IX.
